Since combining their efforts to form the Maine Trucking 4 Kids Convoy the Lions and the Maine Professional Drivers Association have raised over \$103,000 for organizations that help kids in various ways. Camp Sunshine alone has received \$51,820!

This year the event was held on September 28th and convoyed through South Portland and Scarborough. The convoy portion started at Scarborough Downs and ended there after circling the

Truck-Related Fatalities Declined Last Year

The number of Americans killed in truck-related crashes fell 4.4% to 4,808 last year, the lowest total in 15 years, the Department of Transportation reported in August. DOT reports that road fatalities and truck-related fatalities both declined last year

The number of people killed in heavy-duty truck-related crashes fell 4.4% to 4,808, from 5,027 in 2006, DOT said. Overall traffic fatalities fell to 41,059, the lowest number since 1994, and the fatality rate per 100 million vehicle miles traveled was 1.37, the lowest fatality rate on record, DOT said. The 2.49 million people who were injured in highway crashes last year was the lowest since the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration began collecting injury data in 1988.

DOT said motorcycle fatalities now account for 13% of all fatalities and that the number of motorcycle riders or passengers killed on the nation's roads increased 6.6% over the previous year. Transportation Secretary Mary Peters said DOT will continue its efforts to combat impaired driving, increase safety belt use and improve motorcycle safety.

Our Future?

With crude oil prices bouncing, the World economies will need to make adjustments. I see these adjustments, and the uncertainties that come with them, plaguing those industries that are heavy users of petroleum fuels relative to revenue. Trucking and forest products industries are the two that are the closest to my thoughts. The problems we see were a long time getting here and I expect there will be reasons for concern for quite some time.

Those of us who earn our livings in these industries must be as proactive as possible. Business as usual will not be an option. Those who are successful must change their ways. Letting \$3.70 fuel go up the stack and earn no revenue is no longer an option.

The one technology area above all others that is important for the future of the heavy - duty truck business is fuel conservation. Fuel conservation will not be merely a question of price. It soon will be a question of economic survival. Trucking can no longer ignore any of the four major disciplines of fleet efficiency and conservation:

> Engine and drive train technology; Heavy-vehicle aerodynamics; Preventive maintenance; and Driver skills and practices.

Each of these disciplines carries roughly the same potential for savings, but used together, they represent a more powerful force than any government agency mandate. So, while there is no need to panic, it is certainly a good time for all facets of the trucking industry to move quickly in all areas of fuel efficiency.

State of New Hampshire "Move Over" Law

Governor John H. Lynch will sign HB1235 into law at the Executive Council Chamber at the State House at 3 p.m. on Tuesday, July 8, 2008. The bill strengthens the state's "Move Over" law, which requires motorists to slow down and move away from the scene of roadside incidents, such as motor vehicle stops, crashes and breakdowns.

The bill expands coverage of the "Move Over" law by requiring motorists to respond to blue, red and amber warning lights, which includes tow truck operators and highway crews, as well as police, fire and emergency medical personnel. It is intended to reduce roadside deaths and injuries to emergency personnel and members of the public.

This law took effect on August 5, 2008.

New Hampshire Truck Driver Dies

Aaron Staelens, 43, of Richmond, NH lost his life in an accident after being severely burned on I-91 in Chicopee, Mass. in March. Staelens' tanker crashed into a guardrail and exploded after a car collided with him and he veered to the right to try to avoid getting hit, state police said.

The driver of the car, Victor Aponte, 35, of Holyoke was issued a summons to face charges including negligent motor vehicle homicide and reckless operation. Staelens worked for Abenaqui Carriers of North Hampton, N.H.

Staelens had been a truck driver for more than 15 years and had 5 children.

America's Road Team Driver Tony Sifford Dies in Crash

Tony Sifford, 41, an America's Road Team captain since 2007, died Sept. 24 near Ruston, La., from injuries sustained in a highway accident that day. His FedEx Ground partner, Rodney Palmer, 38, died the following day.

A resident of Hillsville, Va., Sifford made frequent runs between Virginia and Dallas for FedEx's truck-based parcel carrier. Beyond his work as an owner-operator, he was deeply involved in industry affairs, whether testifying on Capitol Hill on trucking issues, recruiting new drivers to the industry, instructing people on highway safety or participating in the National Truck Driving Championships.

"Tony Sifford was devoted to the trucking industry, accumulating 1.8 million accident-free miles during his 14-year career," said Bill Graves, president of American Trucking Associations. "But more importantly, Tony was a part of the ATA family, a dedicated Road Team captain and an amazing person."

America's Road Team is an ATA-sponsored group of drivers who advocate for highway safety through events such as Share the Road.

ATA said Sifford had volunteered in the Trucker Buddy program, which sets up pen-pal relationships between drivers and elementary school classes. He also taped a video presentation for Ford Motor Co. earlier this year to recruit laid-off auto workers to work as commercial vehicle drivers. Sifford testified this year to members of both the U.S. House of Representatives and the Senate on the effects of high diesel fuel prices.

"Tony made such a strong impact on so many people with his knowledge and passion for the industry," said Elisabeth Barna, an ATA vice president who worked with Sifford on the Road Team.

He is survived by his wife, Gena; a daughter, Hannah; a son, Isaac; and his parents, Leonard and Janice. A memorial fund for the benefit of his children will be administered at the Grayson National Bank in Hillsville.



Maine Turnpike News York Toll Booth



The replacement of the York Toll Booth is in the planning process and several meetings have been held for public input. This issue has generated some very heated debate in the York area where proposals for construction of a new toll booth plaza will possibly take place. The proposed locations include Mile 8.7, 9.5, 11.3 and 13.2. Each location involves the acquisition of property including at least one home at each location.

While MPDA has not gotten involved in the hot issue of the location of the proposed replacement for the York toll booth plaza, the Board of Directors has come up with a statement establishing the MPDA position. "Our Assn. is not as concerned with the location of the tollbooths but that they be located in such a way that is the safest for all highway users. This should include consideration for not being near an exit, having at least two or three high speed lanes in both directions and that those lanes be located to the left in the direction of travel and that it have a long, flat, straight approach. Our interests lie in the safety of the motoring public."
